She has also done volunteer work with Girl Guides of Canada, the United Church of Canada, Canadian Mental Health Association, Shuswap Singers, Shuswap Theatre Society and a couple of museums along the way. Marcus Smith (standing for re-election)

So, who is Marcus Smith? Or, more appropriately, who am I? I have 10+ years experience with the Shuswap Theatre - starting with Queen of the Shuswap in 2003. My involvement this past season included acting in Little Shop of Horrors, Technical Director, Set Design and Construction for Distracted, and acting in The Complete Works of William Shakespeare (abridged). I have partaken in many, many other productions - I have directed, done lighting design, set design, musical production/writing, script editing, video mapping, and of course, acting.

But.. what do I bring to the table? Outside of the theatre, my experiences in the arts community in Salmon Arm and abroad have been more related to the musical side of things, though I have delved into independent film, and community radio - more about that later, though.

As a member of musical groups and as a solo artist I have been tasked with promotions for myself and other groups as well. This includes, but is not limited to, Poster Design and Printing, Handbill design and Distribution, not to mention what happens when the show must go on; Live Sound, Lighting, many, many set-ups and take-downs, Ticket Sales, and Door Security.

I have done direction, prop design and acquisition, acting, lighting, and every other little thing involved with some small, independent films I have had the opportunity to partake in. This, in fact, culminated in the premiere of one of our films at the Salmar Theatre, complete with liquor license, Q&A session with the Cast and Crew, and a small gala opening.

I am a 13 year volunteer of the Salmon Arm Roots and Blues Festival, performing in the role of Site Electrician, Parking Supervisor, and Stage Crew.

I served on the Board of Directors for the Voice of the Shuswap Broadcast Society for two years, during initial formation of the radio station, and one year with the Board of Shuswap Theatre.

Though I have never thought myself to be particularly enamoured with the idea of administration, I've learned over the past year that my skill set is of a great value.

I look forward to representing the membership for another great year.

Ruth Thomas (standing for election)

I immigrated from the United Kingdom in 1990. In Britain I worked as a paralegal for several years. After which I co-owned and operated a resort. Once in Canada I co-owned the Petro Can here in Salmon Arm and a book and gift store in Chase. I remarried and moved back to Salmon Arm and have lived and worked on the Neskonlith Indian Reserve since. For much of that time I have worked under various contracts with the Band, most notably helping to develop the commercial arm of the Band, ensuring all legal and financial documents necessary for incorporation were completed. I have also written successful proposals for First Nation Youth at Risk Programmes and environmental programmes. I liaised with various outside agencies to run training programmes to increase youth employability and designed an ethnobotanical protocol

for the post-burn on Mt. Ida, which has since been used as a model by other First Nations. I also worked for two years as an archivist for the Band.

Education: UK High School Grad, Bookkeeping, Business administration, Canadian Grade 12, Financial planner, Tax return specialist, Archaeology (part degree), Environmental Technician

Community Involvement: Much of my community involvement has been with First Nations. I worked with my mother-in-law teaching ethnobotany and First Nation culture and history to local schools and church groups and have conducted ethnobotanical and environment tours and talks for the Fraser Basin Council and the University of Victoria. I am a charter member of the Switsmalph Cultural Society and sat on their Board of Directors for six years acting as both Treasurer and Executive Assistant to the Chair in which capacity I developed their business plan including a 5 year financial plan and completed their application resulting in their subsequent approval as a not-for-profit.

Also, with the Neskonlith Band I was instrumental in developing a co-operative, developing Articles, policies and corporation documents to their successful completion. I also advised on and helped develop a business plan.

Theatre Involvement: My theatre involvement has been limited to attending the occasional production, although my son has been involved as a sound technician, winning an award at Festival for *The Herbal Bed*.

My children are now at an age where I find I have more time to become involved and engaged with community based projects and causes.
