LOOKING BACK AND FORWARD!



THE STEVE I KNEW

Steve became involved with Shuswap Theatre in one of the three one acts we did that first season 1977-78. I was surprised at Steve's memorial to hear that he had been active in school theatre productions in Armstrong, because I remember him being almost

shy (believe it or not) as one of the shoemakers in that first production. Unfortunately, the script was bad, the actors were miscast and needless to say the production was not very good. In January, we had auditions for *BEWARE OF THE DOG*, a compilation of short stories by Chekov. I cast Steve as the lead in the longest story, which comprised the second act. He worked extremely hard at picking up as much acting



Jumping ahead several years, there are two productions I remember as being star performances for

Steve. Steve WAS Harry Van in *IDIOT'S DE-LIGHT*. The showman, who was touring Europe with a group of dancer/singers called "Les Blondes," presents his nightly show to the tourists in an alpine hotel in northern Italy. Steve had the



charm and the audacity of the character to perfection. The only problem was he made it look so easy. The audiences loved the show and we won many awards at the Zone festival and we were definitely the people's choice. The second production I admired Steve for was OTHELLO. He was able to present the bravado of the great military leader and the vulnerability of the man, who

believes his wife is unfaithful. Steve, William Chandler (Iago) and Naomi Gallagher (Desdemona) were all challenged, as was I by this great script. Steve, the teacher, was a wonderful support to Naomi as this young actress worked to create his counterpart. It was a strange production in that audience members stood around after each performance and talked in respectful tones about the performances of the cast.

One of the qualities that Steve had was his awareness of theatre as a team activity and no matter whether it was acting, directing, designing, building, Steve was a part of the team for so many productions. This company approach that is theatre, is what makes us aware of losses – like Steve's. A second quality was his innate ability, that talent for so many aspects of the theatre arts that he possessed and that was seen in the work he did.

What I will personally miss is leaning against the railing out front or at a bar at festival and analyzing what worked and what didn't in the many productions we both saw. Steve's passing for me is the loss of a great collaborator, friend and theatre lover.
